



Orange County

	<p>The Region 5 2017 Regional Needs Assessment (RNA), covers 15 counties served by the Region 5 Prevention Resource Center at the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Council of Deep East Texas.</p>	
<p>The RNA focuses on underage consumption of alcohol and tobacco and the consumption of illicit drugs or prescription drugs not according to a doctor's orders. It contains both quantitative and qualitative data about each of the counties. Both risk and protective factors for substance use as well as descriptive statistics about the population are included.</p>		

This county summary includes numbers for the county based on its population and that can be compared directly to other counties, to the region, to the state or to the U.S.

1	Older	Orange County has fewer young people (under 25 years old) by percentage (32.6%) than the region (33.4%). Its "old" people (ages 45 and older) represent 43.5% compared to the region's 42.3%.
2	Growing	Population estimates for Orange County have grown from 2014 to 2016 by 0.8% compared to the region's estimated loss of population of -0.1%.
3	Dense	Orange County is estimated to have 252.7 people in each square mile in 2015 compared to the region's 66.0 persons per square mile.
4	Language Proficient	In 2015, it was estimated that 3.1% of the people in Orange County speak Spanish. Of those speaking Spanish, 32.9% do not speak English well. That is, only 1.0% of the county are lacking English skills.
5	Higher Income	2015 per capita income in Orange County was \$25,489, higher than the average regional per capita income by 11.7%, but lower than the Texas average by 5.6% and the U.S. average by 11.9%.
6	2 Parents	Compared to the 39% of regional households headed by single parents in 2017, Orange County had 34%.
7	Marriages	The divorce rate per 100,000 in 2014 for Region 5 was 281.1 compared to the rate of 242.1 per 100,000 for Orange County.
8	No Jobs	After 2 years of decline unemployment increased in the region in 2016 to 6.3%. In that year the unemployment rate in Orange County was 6.8%.
9	Assistance	Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) was at a level of 173.7 per 100,000 in the region in 2016, while Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), previously known as food stamps, was given to 16.7 % in 2015. This compares to 221.4 and 15.7% for Orange County.
10	Lunches	69.1% of Orange County's school children received free or reduced school lunches compared to 61.2% of the children in Region 5.
11	Life/Health	Considering how long people live (mortality) and how healthy people are (morbidity), and ranking the 254 counties in Texas, Orange County ranks at 206 in 2017.
12	Race	In 2015 estimates Region 5 is 74% White and 20% Black. (Texas 75% and 12%; the U.S. 74%, 13%) Orange County is 87% White and 8% Black.
